## VISIT OF PRESIDENT OF CYPRUS

Thank you for your letter of 22 March about the arrangements for President Vassiliou's visit.

The Prime Minister has now agreed to give him a working lunch and can make available the period 1250-1430 on 31 March. We envisage three a side (Prime Minister/President, two Foreign Secretaries plus two). But if John Wilberforce were to attend, that would be four on ours, which we can claim as the prerogative of the home side.

I have mentioned this revised plan to the Cyprus High Commissioner.

Vassiliou has now said that he is happy to come to London on 31 March. He quite understands that it will be impossible for the Prime Minister to offer hospitality on this occasion. The Foreign Secretary will offer him a working lunch before the call at Number 10. I understand that the Prime Minister can see Vassiliou from either 2.30 or 3.00 pm for an hour. Perhaps you would confirm in due course which it is to be. Vassiliou has asked if Foreign Minister Iacovou may attend the meeting. Since Iacovou was present during most of the Prime Minister's meetings with former President Kyprianou, the Foreign Secretary supports this request. The Foreign Secretary would recommend that our High Commissioner in Nicosia, John Wilberforce, should be present. He has worked hard over the last nine months to cultivate Vassiliou and, although he leaves Nicosia on retirement at the end of June, his attendance at the meeting would help him to retain his influence with Vassiliou during the next few crucial weeks.
