PRIME MINISTER'S PERSONAL MESSAGE SERIAL No. TIOO ST LONDON SW1A 2AA THE PRIME MINISTER 30 June 1988 Dear Primi Phrister Since my message to you of 23 May, Senor Perez de Cuellar has continued to keep me informed of his attempt to secure an early resumption of inter-communal negotiations on the problem of Cyprus.

> It is encouraging that President Vassiliou has accepted the Secretary-General's proposals as they stand. This shows welcome flexibility, by abandoning previous Greek Cypriot pre-conditions for negotiations between the two sides.

However I am perturbed that, while accepting the Secretary-General's invitation to the proposed meeting in Geneva, Mr. Denktash remains unwilling to commit himself to negotiations on the lines proposed by Senor Perez de Cuellar, and is raising procedural difficulties. A "social" meeting of the kind Mr. Denktash appears to have in mind would have little value. The pressing need is for the two sides to start real negotiations. I very much hope that you will feel able to use your influence with Mr. Denktash when he visits Turkey next week, to persuade him not to insist on pre-conditions from the Turkish Cypriot side. Otherwise he will appear responsible for erecting a major road-block in the way of the search for the settlement in Cyprus which we all, including Mr. Denktash, wish to see achieved.
