MR. GORBACHEV'S VISIT: INTERVIEW WITH IZVESTIYA

Thank you for your letter of 30 January proposing that the Prime Minister should give an interview to Izvestiya before Mr. Gorbachev's visit here. The Prime Minister would be ready in principle to give an interview to Mr. Laptev. But before agreeing, she thinks we ought to try and persuade Mr. Gorbachev to give an interview to a major British newspaper ahead of his visit, for instance The Times which has long had an application outstanding. I should be grateful if the Department could explore this possibility with the Soviet Ambassador hinting that it may have a bearing on the Prime Minister's readiness to give an interview to Izvestiya.

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Residence and Commonwealth Office London SW1A 2AH ark lier In Cataler give a Babill paper 30 January 1989 Mr Gorbachev's visit: Interview with Izvestiya The Soviet Ambassador told the head of our Soviet Department on Friday that we would shortly be getting a request from the editor of the Soviet government newspaper Izvestiya, Mr Laptev, for an interview with the Prime Minister at some time of her choosing, not too long before Mr Gorbachev's visit. Mr Zamyatin asked if the Prime Minister might in principle be prepared to grant such an interview. Izvestiya is the government's daily paper. It has a current circulation of 12 million or so. Of the two main dailies, it is at the present the more interesting and adventurous, and the more pro-reformist. In standard Soviet style the most likely form that the interview would taken when it reaches the pages of the newspaper is a verbatim account of the editor's conversation with the Prime Minister, possibly with a certain amount of scene-setting about No 10 and the forthcoming visit. On past form they are unlikely to edit it in any major way and certainly not take out points that they will know that the Prime Minister wishes to get across. The Foreign Secretary recommends, therefore, that the Prime Minister should agree to do such an interview. If she were able to set aside a date and time to receive Mr Laptev, perhaps in mid-March or shortly before her departure for Africa, a suitable steer could be given to Mr Zamyatin.
