Thank you for your letter of 3 March about the exhibition of contemporary Soviet culture which you are arranging in April to coincide with Mr Gorbachev's visit.

#### EXHIBITION OF SOVIET CULTURE, LONDON, APRIL 1989

I am writing to let you know, since your Department will be coordinating the programme for the visit next month of President Gorbachev, that in response to an informal request from the Soviet side, I have proposed formally to the Russians that I should mount at my expense an exhibition of contemporary Soviet culture to coincide with the Gorbachev visit. They have accepted; and we have asked that Mr. Gorbachev should visit and, if possible open the Exhibition. The Russians have now asked that we should inform the appropriate British authorities of this proposal so that it can be noted as a candidate for inclusion in the President's programme.

The fuller background is set out in the attached copies of my letters to Alexander Yakovlev and Vladimir Falin at the Central Committee, to Nikolai Tchetverikov at VAAP and Georgy Miasnikov at the Cultural Foundation. Ambassador Zamyatin in London is also aware of these exchanges.

The venue for the Exhibition is being finalised this week; and I shall let you know as soon as it is confirmed, together with other relevant details. If you require any further information, please ask your officials to contact Peter Jay here. Meanwhile, for convenience I am sending copies of this letter and enclosures to David Young (DTI), Richard Luce (Arts) and Charles Powell (No. 10).

## PROPOSED SOVIET CULTURAL EXHIBITIONS TO CELEBRATE VISIT OF PRESIDENT M S GORBACHEV, APRIL 1989

Further to my letter of 22 February, 1989, and to the confirmation that we have received from Comrade Chairman Tchetverikov at VAAP that our proposal is warmly accepted by the Soviet authorities, I write to entreat your good offices in one further vital feature of the Exhibition, namely that His Excellency, the President, will consent to open the Exhibition on 5 or 6 April during his visit to London.

I will be supplying you very soon with precise details of the intended venue and other arrangements in London for the Exhibition. I am confident that Comrade Tchetverikov at VAAP and Comrade Miasnikov at the Cultural Foundation, to both of whom I am also writing today, will be able to provide you with timely information about the exhibits which are being provided from the Soviet Union to illustrate the theme suggested by Comrade Tchetverikov of "The USSR in Process of Perestroika".

I shall be grateful for your earliest possible response to this request, because it is very important that we here arrange the most effective possible publicity for the Exhibition in order to attract the widest possible interest; and the opening by the President of the USSR will provide the keystone of that arch.

I shall also be most grateful for your personal support in securing a positive response to my letter to Comrade Miasnikov, seeking a contribution by the Cultural Foundation to the Exhibition of items representing Soviet art to complement the more commercial products that VAAP is likely to wish to show. ### EXHIBITION OF SOVIET CULTURE, LONDON, APRIL 1989

I have been delighted to receive confirmation from our good friend, Comrade Chairman Tchetverikov at VAAP, that my proposal to mount urgently an Exhibition of Soviet Culture in London to coincide with the important visit from 5-7 April of His Excellency, the President of the USSR, has been accepted, with the warm further acquiescence of our good friend, Comrade Falin, at the International Department of the Central Committee.

For your convenience I enclose a copy of my earlier letter to Comrade Falin setting out my proposal. We have since agreed to concentrate our energies on the Exhibition in London, since the President's dates for possible visits to Paris and Rome are not yet known.

I now earnestly entreat your own active help and support. It is of the utmost importance that the Exhibition with its provisional title "The USSR in Process of Perestroika" should be fully worthy of the occasion of the President's visit. Indeed, we hope very much that the President himself will open it; and I shall be writing to Comrade Falin to ask him to convey this request.

I believe that our good friend Comrade Tchetverikov will be selecting Soviet cultural products in all areas of publishing. But it is equally important that contemporary Soviet arts are properly represented, for example by paintings and, perhaps, suitable ikons from your great collection. May I please ask, if you can join us in this important venture, that in liaison with Comrade Tchetverikov who is coordinating the provision of material from the Soviet Union for the Exhibition, you will inform us by 10 March of the exhibits which the Cultural Foundation would wish and is able to contribute? We hope very much that the Foundation will be personally represented at the opening.

I am sending a copy of this letter to Comrade Chairman Tchetverikov and to Comrade Falin at the Central Committee and to His Excellency, Ambassador Zamyatin in London.
