THE RT. HON. MARGARET THATCHER, FRS, MP, THE PRIME MINISTER

Mrs. Margaret Thatcher, Conservative Member of Parliament for Barnet, Finchley, is Britain's 49th Prime Minister and the first woman to hold the Office. She was appointed Prime Minister, First Lord of the Treasury and Minister for the Civil Service on 4 May 1979, following the success of the Conservative Party in the general election of the previous day. When the Conservative Party subsequently won the general elections of 9 June 1983 and 11 June 1987 Mrs. Thatcher became the first British Prime Minister this century to successfully contest three consecutive general elections. This year she became the longest serving British Prime Minister this century.

Margaret Hilda Thatcher was born on 13 October 1925, the daughter of a grocer who was active in local politics as borough councillor, alderman and Mayor of Grantham. She went from elementary school to Kesteven and Grantham Girls' High School, won a bursary to Somerville College, Oxford, and obtained a degree in Natural Science (BSc). She is also a Master of Arts (MA) of Oxford University. In June 1983 she was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society (FRS).

On leaving Oxford she worked for four years as a research chemist to an industrial firm, reading for the Bar in her spare time. She was called to the Bar by Lincoln's Inn in 1954, and practised as a barrister, specialising in taxation law.

While an undergraduate she was President of the Oxford University Conservative Association. As Miss Margaret Roberts she contested two parliamentary elections for the Conservative Party, in 1950 and 1951, before being elected (after her marriage) to the House of Commons in 1959 as Member for Finchley. She represented Finchley until the constituency boundary changes of 1974 since when she has sat for Barnet, Finchley.

Mrs. Thatcher's first ministerial appointment came in 1961, when she became a Parliamentary Secretary to the then Ministry of Pensions and National Insurance, remaining in this position until the change of Government in 1964. From 1964 to 1970, while the Conservatives were in Opposition, she was a front-bench spokesman for her party in the House of Commons, and from 1967 a member of the Shadow Cabinet, being concerned during this period with a very wide range of subjects, including social security, housing and land, Treasury matters, fuel and power, transport and education. When the Conservatives returned to office in June 1970, she was appointed Secretary of State for Education and Science and was made a Privy Counsellor. After the general election of February 1974 she was appointed to the Shadow Cabinet and became Opposition front-bench spokesman, first on the environment and later (in December 1974) on Treasury matters. She was elected Leader of the Conservative Party and thus Leader of the Opposition in February 1975.

Since becoming Prime Minister, Mrs. Thatcher has visited the United States, France, the Federal Republic of Germany (and West Berlin), Italy, Japan, Australia, Zambia, Yugoslavia, Greece, Luxembourg, the Irish Republic, the Netherlands, India, Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates, Oman, Qatar, Canada, Bahrain, Kuwait, Pakistan, Mexico, Belgium, Hong Kong, China, Denmark, the Falkland Islands, Hungary, Portugal, the Soviet Union, Malaysia, Singapore, Brunei, Indonesia, Sri Lanka, Egypt, Jordan, Norway, the Bahamas, Israel, Jamaica, Kenya, Nigeria and Turkey.

As Prime Minister, Mrs. Thatcher has visited the United States of America on eleven occasions. In 1983 she received the Winston Churchill Foundation of the United States of America Award and in 1985 she addressed a joint meeting of the American Congress.

Mrs. Thatcher's husband, Denis Thatcher, whom she married in 1951, served in the Second World War as a Major in the Royal Artillery. He is a former director of Burmah Castrol and is a director of other companies. Mr. and Mrs. Thatcher have a twin son and daughter, Mark who is a businessman, married to an American, Diane, based in Dallas, Texas, and Carol, a journalist, who were born on 15 August 1953.

PASSAGE FOR THE CEREMONIAL PROGRAMME TO BE ISSUED BY THE CITY OF LONDON ON THE OCCASION OF MR GORBACHEV'S SPEECH AT THE GUILDHALL

Committee of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union and Chairman of the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet of the USSR is paying an official visit to Great Britain at the invitation of the British Government. This is his third visit to the British Isles.

In December 1984 Mr Gorbachev visited Britain at the head of a Supreme Soviet delegation. The talks which took place at Chequers with the Prime Minister, Mrs Thatcher, and Mr Gorbachev's meetings with Parliamentarians and with representatives of the worlds of politics and business, launched a substantive political dialogue between the two countries. At the heart of this dialogue lies the question of how, despite the complicated international situation, to channel the tide of events towards a reduction of tension and the establishment of peaceful and mutually beneficical cooperation between states with different social systems in all areas of human intellectual and physical endeavour.

It is these principles which increasingly underlie the political dialogue between the Soviet and British leadership, An example of this can be seen in the fruitful talks between Mr Gorbachev and Mrs Thatcher during the British Prime Minister's visit to Moscow in the Spring of 1987. During these talks the two leaders examined the possibility of extending and deepening the all European process and above all its most important aspect, political and military relationships. During Mr Gorbachev's stopover at Brize Norton in December 1987 on his way to the US to sign the Soviet-American INF Treaty, the two leaders made a careful analysis of the views of both sides on the launching

of real disamrament in Europe and carried forward the search for ways of reducing armed confrontation on the continent and replacing it by collaboration between East and West in solving common problems.

The current visit is Mr Gorbachev's first visit to Western Europe in his capacity as Soviet Head of State. It is aimed at deepening and developing the Soviet concept of new international relations, which the Soviet leader expounded in detail from the podium of the UN General Assembly in December 1988. The concept is founded on an understanding of the mutual interdependence and fragility of today's world, the primacy of universal human values over narrow group, bloc or national interests, and on practical cooperation between all countries in the resolution of global problems such as disarmament, environmental protection and the fight against hunger and disease.

Soviet new political thinking which has stimulated constructive developments in East-West relations, is indissolubly linked with perestroika in the Soviet Union.

Mr Gorbachev's policies are closely connected to fundamental changes in the economic and political system. For the last four years a programme of intense the finite of the first law been unfolding to designed to increase the efficiency of socialist economic management and to strengthen the legal and political basis of people's power in the country and the democratisation of Soviet society. The main generator of these new ideas, and the leading force in the reconstruction process in the country, is the Communist Party. It is the wide support which the Soviet people give to this policy which guarantees the irreversibility of perestroika.

Mikhail Sergeevich Gorbachev was born on March 2nd 1931 in the village of Privolnoe in Stavropol region in southern Russia. He began his working life at 15 as a combine harvester driver. He studied law at Moscow State University, graduating in 1955. In 1967 he graduated from Stavropol Agricultural Institute. In the mid 1950's he was a leader of the Communist Youth Organisation (Komsomol), first at town level and then for the whole Stavropol region. In 1966 he was elected to party work as Secretary of the Town Committee, and then to the post of First Secretary of the Stavropol Regional Committee of the CPSU.

The Stavropol region is one of the largest administrative regions of southern Russian and is a major agricultural centre.

In 1970 Mr Gorbachev was elected to the highest legislative body in the country, the Supreme Soviet, becoming a member of the Soviet Parliament. In 1971 at the 24th Congress of the CPSU he was elected to the Central Committee, and to the post of Secretary of the Central Committee in 1978. In that same year he was elected to Candidate Membership of the Politburo and to full Membership in 1980. Since that time he has worked in Moscow.

In March 1985 Mr Gorbachev was elected to the post of General Secretary of the Central Committee of the CPSU and in October 1988 the Supreme Soviet elected him Chairman of the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet of the USSR.

Mr Gorbachev is Chairman of the USSR Defence

The General Secretary's wife, RAISA MAKSIMOVNA GORBACHEVA was born in Siberia in the town of Rubtsovsk. She graduated from the Philosophy Faculty of Moscow State University and then worked as a teacher in higher educational establishments. She is a Reader with an M.Phil degree (specialising in Sociology) and a member of the Praesidium of the Board of the Soviet Cultural Foundation. The Gorbachevs have an adult daughter.


