Prime Minister's Visit to the Soviet Union: Human Rights Cases In our briefing for the Prime Minister's visit to Moscow we covered the human rights issue in general terms. When the Foreign Secretary visited Moscow for talks with Mr Shevardnadze in April the Russians were given a list of human rights cases which concerned us. We think it would be useful if an updated list of names of Soviet citizens who have been refused exit visas could be given to the Soviet authorities at the time of the Prime Minister's visit. If you agree, we might ask HMA Moscow to hand such a list to one of the senior officials in the margins of the Prime Minister's talks with President Gorbachev.
