Dear Charles

You may recall the support given earlier this year by the Government, and indeed the Prime Minister herself, to our bid for the Turkish telecommunications satellite project. This was naturally highly valued by the company.

Until today all the evidence pointed to the leading contenders being British Aerospace, with Hughes Aircraft (USA) a close second, while the French bid from Aerospatiale was a long way third, some \$75m higher than our own price as the attached table of price information obtained on good authority shows.

From the start, at the insistence of the French, there has been a no-aid agreement in relation to the programme, acceded to by all Western Governments likely to be involved - our own bid includes ANT (part of the Bosch Group) from FRG.

In an extraordinary decision today, which I know has been reported by the British Embassy in Ankara, The Minister of Transport has selected the Aerospatiale bid, we believe (again on good authority) against all the recommendations of his officials concerned with the evaluation, in spite of both the \$75m price gap and a poorer technical evaluation than BAe.

Although these are difficult times in the Muslim world, I would be grateful if serious consideration could be given to urging the Turkish Government to reconsider its decision on this commercial programme, or at least to delay promulgation of the decision until some of the circumstances surrounding it are better understood. This order is crucial to our position as a supplier in the world spacecraft market. Its loss would obviously also be unhelpful to the UK balance of trade.


