ARGENTINE REQUEST FOR SATELLITE COVERAGE OF FALKLAND ISLANDS

1. The Secretary of State will wish to be aware that the Argentines have sought from the Americans coverage of the

A Falkland Islands by LANDSAT (Washington telno 1308). LANDSAT has a purely civilian role. The information it produces is public, and Argentina - like the UK - is a subscriber to

the LANDSAT programme. Washington telno 1316 describes
LANDSAT's capability. The Defence Intelligence experts
in the MOD do not believe that the Argentines would be able
to derive any significant military intelligence from LANDSAT
coverage of the Falkland Islands, provided that the
material obtained was processed at no greater than the
normal speed. Coverage of the task force could, however,
if weather conditions were perfect (unlikely), be damaging.
The Americans have said that they feel obliged to agree to
the Argentine request.

C 2. The story has broken in the press (Washington telno 1323), and Mr Silkin has been reported as saying that he will raise the matter in the House this week.

3. Despite the arguments of our Embassy, it seems clear that the Americans will go ahead. Since our defence intelligence advice is that the pass over the Falklands requested by the Argentines would not reveal any significant military intelligence, it does not seem worth having a row with the Americans on this point. But clearly we will need to keep a close eye on any future request.

4. The Americans have prepared a public line (Washington telno 1329) which emphasises the civilian nature of LANDSAT and denies that they are providing the Argentines with any satellite intelligence. We have since received from the

E American Embassy the complete text of their guidance telegram.

5. I attach a draft line for use with the press and in

Parliament if necessary. This has been cleared with the MOD
