

Minutes

DCI Casey introduced the briefing, noting it would describe what the U.S. and the West are losing and how the Soviets are benefiting.

Mr. Casey noted that many KGB officers have recently been expelled in Europe,

the kev Soviet decision makers and acquirers of Western technology.

With examples of what the Soviets acquired in the 1979-1980, how they used it, and what benefits were realized. The Soviets made acquisitions in strategic missiles, air defense, aircraft carrier catapults, space reconnaissance, and tactical weapons. The Soviets learned new approaches, raised the technology level, and shortened their development time, as well as saved money for their weapons programs.

That about 2/3 of the collection involves US technology, and about 90% is collected by the KGB and the GRU.

The President asked if Congress knew how serious the loss was.

The President recalled that a Swiss high technology company was owned by Libya and asked how much of this type of operation existed. Mr. Casey responded that a huge amount did, noting especially the many trading companies in Vienna. Secretary Baldrige noted there were hundreds of companies owned by Eastern Bloc countries around the world. Judge Webster noted there were many front companies in the US for acquiring products.
