PRESIDENT CLINTON'S CALL TO THE PRIME MINISTER

1. I have mentioned separately that Jane Holl (NSC), who was with the President when he telephoned the Prime Minister, told me that she had never seen him as angry as he was when he read last week's Sunday Times piece about the Adams visa. Holl also said that the President had been very up-beat at the end of his conversation with the Prime Minister, and clearly felt it had gone well.

2. Dr Holl said that the discussion on Northern Ireland was very brief. The President had raised the subject. He had taken full responsibility for the decision to give Adams a visa. It had been a difficult matter of judgement, on which the two governments had evidently differed. He did not wish to go over the reasoning once again, but wanted to assure the Prime Minister that he and Reynolds had his fullest support. He was determined that the US should play a constructive role as the two Prime Ministers continued their search for peace.

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
