would be necessary for him to inform the Security Council by letter that British administration had been restored in South Georgia. This could not be done at present, since the MOD's announcement concerned only the recapture of Grytviken. He was, therefore, strongly inclined to leave this until tomorrow. It would not matter, he thought, if the Argentines issued a ''bleat'' first.

4. Sir A Parsons was about to appear on the News Night programme on which he would be interviewed live through a satellite link. We agreed that if he was questioned about whether we would be calling the Security Council, he should say that we had no intention of doing so at present. Indeed we saw no need to do this. Argentina had had three weeks in which to comply with SC 502 and had given no indication of its intention to do so. We had given Argentina full and fair warning of our intentions. Noone should be surprised if we carried them out. If asked whether he thought others might call a meeting with the Security Council he would say that he frankly had not the faintest idea, and would sound generally discouraging about the prospects that much could be achieved through the Security Council at this time.
