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Since our discussion yesterday evening, I have given further thought to possible ways of giving Cambridgeshire additional financial help to meet the costs of policing at the two RAF bases at Molesworth and Alconbury.

I have considered a number of options and the effect at different levels of expenditure. I have come to the conclusion that the best course would be to adopt the same arrangements which we have used for financing the miners' dispute, but confining assistance to the additional costs arising from policing mass demonstrations at Molesworth and Alconbury. You will recall that for the miners' dispute assistance was based on a threshold of a one penny rate expenditure, above which special financial assistance was given. There was also a cut off point for the total share which a local authority would be expected to bear. The product of a 1p rate in Cambridgeshire is £0.9m. Additional costs up to that point would be shared equally between the Home Office and Cambridgeshire in the normal way. Beyond that point, we should meet 90% of the costs (that is, 50% police grant and 40% special payment). Cambridgeshire's total share would not exceed the product of a 3p rate. Thus, if costs were £1m, our share would be £0.54m; at £2m, £1.44m, and at £3m, £2.34m. Once the total expenditure exceeded a little over £3m we would meet all the further costs. Using this arrangement will have the advantage that we can easily apply the system for administering the miners' dispute special payment.

I have considered whether we should reveal only part of our proposals at this stage, as we did with the miners' dispute. I have concluded that if the county council are to settle their budget next week with the necessary degree of confidence we shall have to reassure them that there will be a limit to their share, and that below their limit a specified proportion of the costs will be met. I would, however, propose to say nothing about the period beyond the financial year 1985/6 since that is outside the period to which the budget applies.

I propose, therefore, that I should tell Cambridgeshire that we shall be prepared to give special financial assistance in meeting the additional costs of policing mass demonstrations at Molesworth and Alconbury in 1985/6 on the same basis as the assistance which we are giving with the costs of policing the miners' dispute. I shall give further thought to the handling of this news.


Thank you for your letter of 25 January. The Prime Minister has seen and noted the terms of the Home Secretary's letter of 25 January to Cambridgeshire County Council.

In the light of the representations to me from Cambridgeshire Members, I have been giving further thought to the question of the financial arrangements for policing at Molesworth and Alconbury. As I said in my letter of 14 January, we cannot foresee now the scale of policing which may be needed in the coming months. However, I accept that if there are mass demonstrations of the kind which took place at Greenham Common in 1983 and 1984 there are likely to be heavy policing costs.

I thought it would be helpful to the County Council, in settling their budget for next year, to know that the Government will be prepared to give special assistance in meeting the additional costs of policing mass demonstrations at Molesworth and Alconbury in 1985-86 on the same basis as the assistance which we are giving with the costs of policing the miners' dispute. This means that the Home Office would meet 50% of the costs, up to the product of a 1p rate (£0.9M); beyond that, we should pay 90% (50% police grant and 40% special payment). So if the costs of policing mass demonstrations reached £3M, as you suggested in your letter, the Home Office would pay 13.34M, leaving £0.66M to be found by the County Council. If the costs were £2M, the Home Office would pay £1.44M. But the County Council's share of the costs would be limited to the product of a 3/4p rate; consequently, if the costs exceeded just over £3M, the Home Office would meet all the further costs. I am confidend that the police authority and the Chief Constable will do all they can to ensure that the arrangements for policing mass demonstrations are cost-effective, and because of this, I feel I can give you this assurance about the financial arrangements at this stage.

The question of a disregard under section 8 of the Local Government Finance Act 1982 is, of course, a matter for Patrick Jenkin. He has told me that he will give very sympathetic consideration to any application from the County Council for a disregard, should that prove necessary.

I am sending a copy of this letter to Margaret Shaw, as Chairman of the police authority.
