
CONFIDENTIAL Foreign and Commonwealth Office London SW1A 2AH 27 January 1986 Visit to London by Dr FitzGerald The Irish Ambassador telephoned David Goodall on 24 January on instructions to say that the Taoiseach had accepted an invitation to speak at the Institute of Petroleum dinner in London on 19 February and was proposing to take the opportunity of carrying out a number of other engagements in London over the three days 18-20 February, including a Parliamentary Press Gallery lunch, also on 19 February.

Dr FitzGerald hoped very much that it would be possible for him to have a meeting with the Prime Minister at some point during his stay and would defer fixing up the rest of his programme until he knew whether, and if so when, this would be possible. Noel Dorr said that the Taoiseach believed that a meeting around the middle of February would be timely and useful. Subject to the views of the Secretary of State for Northern Ireland, the Foreign Secretary is inclined to agree that a meeting between the Taoiseach and the Prime Minister on one of the dates proposed would be a good opportunity to take stock of developments in Ireland since the conclusion of the Anglo-Irish Agreement and to impress on Dr FitzGerald personally the importance of positive action by the Irish Government and the SDLP to demonstrate that the Agreement is bringing benefits to the people of Northern Ireland as a whole. I should be grateful if you could let me know what reply the Prime Minister would like us to convey to the Irish Ambassador.
