ROY GRIFFITHS

Last year you wanted Roy Griffiths to serve as Chief Executive for the Health Service. But in the end Sir John Sainsbury would not release him, so we had to settle for Victor Paige.

Roy Griffiths is planning to leave Sainsbury's this July. He doesn't believe that Victor Paige has got to grips with the Health Service. Ministers are too tied up in day-to-day politics to provide businesslike management. So Roy Griffiths believes there is a gap which he can fill.

This idea has many attractions:

- i. Roy Griffiths has a very impressive commercial background as the Managing Director of Sainsbury's.
- ii. He is a widely known and respected figure in the health world.
- iii. He would be under a clear duty to deliver what his own Report says can be achieved.
- iv. Money would not be a problem, as he will have a generous pension from Sainsbury's.

But there are problems as well:

- i. The timing is bad. Victor Paige will be half way through a 3-year contract this summer. He won't relish being overshadowed by Roy Griffiths. On the other hand, if we don't get him this summer he will accept other offers, and a great opportunity will have been missed.
- ii. Finding a slot in the organisation. He doesn't want to be a civil servant, because he wants to cut down the central DHSS administration. Sir Kenneth Stowe may well be unhappy with this.

This idea is still at a very early stage. Norman Fowler doesn't know about it. Roy Griffiths doesn't want to pursue it unless he feels he has your backing.

Next Steps



ROY GRIFFITHS: DISCUSSION WITH NORMAN FOWLER

I had a personal word with the Secretary of State about Sir Roy Griffiths yesterday evening.

I recalled that the Prime Minister had been keen to appoint
Roy Griffiths Chairman of the Management Board back in January
1985. Sir John Sainsbury had not been willing to release him
in advance of his retirement. Roy Griffiths' contract with
Sainsbury's would come to an end this summer, and I wondered
if it would now be possible to use his experience and talents
in some way. It was almost 3 years since his Inquiry was set
up; it might, for example, be useful to commission him to
investigate whether it was being successfully implemented.

Mr Fowler asked if Roy Griffiths had been to see the Prime Minister. I said that he had not. But if Norman Fowler and Roy Griffiths wished to see the Prime Minister together to discuss NHS management and a possible rôle for Roy Griffiths, I would be optimistic that such a meeting could be arranged.

Mr Fowler said that he would invite Roy Griffiths to a personal lunch. He had not realised Roy Griffiths might shortly be available, and would think about how to use him. He was particularly keen on some sort of investigation of how the management reforms were going.

Mr Fowler's tone was friendly and interested. I got the impression that the germ of an idea had been implanted in his mind. It is now up to Roy Griffiths to persuade Mr Fowler that there is a job for him to do.
