Dear Daphne,

I hope to have a word with you on the telephone but in case I miss you could you come to No. 10 at 1800 hours on Sunday evening. I do not think the Prime Minister will be able to feed you. I set out below the information which you will require which I hope will be of some help to you. Mrs. Thatcher will definitely require a shawl for Korea. When you pack next week could you make sure that the Carmen rollers are in.

**KOREA**

Mid-day temperatures could reach 24° C. Midnight temperatures could drop to 7°C or below. Can be sunny mid-day. Lightweight spring wear should be satisfactory (suits or dress and jackets). Evenings can be very chilly and public buildings/Blue House would not normally be heated in May. Hats are not usually worn at ceremonies such as wreath-laying, but occasionally Embassy staff wear hats because it is a British occasion. Long dress/black tie needed for President's dinner. The Korean colours of mourning are black/white. A coat might be needed for Panmunjon and Gloster Valley.

**TOKYO**

The climate in early May is variable. The maximum temperature about is 21°C and the minimum 13°C. Dress for all occasions at the Summit is informal apart from the Imperial Banquet on Tuesday 6 May which is black tie/long dress. Invitees to this Imperial Banquet will be the Heads of Delegation, Ministers, Personal Representatives and the Ambassador for each Delegation.

## PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO SEOUL AND TOKYO: HAIR APPOINTMENTS

PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO KOREA: 1-4 MAY

As I am sure the Prime Minister has mentioned to you she is going to Korea in May followed by Tokyo for the Economic Summit.

Temperatures reach 24 degrees centigrade during the day but it is cold at night. Light weight spring wear should be satisfactory but the evenings can be very chilly. There is a President's dinner during the visit and a long dress will be required. The Korean colours of mourning are black/white. Mrs Thatcher might require an overcoat during the visit as well.
