

PRIME MINISTER

VISIT TO KOREA

I attach some proposals for the programme for your visit to Korea.

The basic shape is to go first to Seoul to carry out formal engagements on the Saturday morning; spend the Saturday afternoon visiting Gloster Valley and Panmunjom; then fly to the South of the country on the Sunday afternoon to visit some major industrial sites and the UN cemetery, before flying on to Tokyo.

It seems to me a good concept: but a bit too much has been jammed in. You will be having your bilateral with President Reagan very shortly after arriving in Tokyo on the second day. There are also some very early starts. But I think it is just manageable. It would be helpful for planning purposes to know:

LETTER BEGINS:

PRESS ARRANGEMENTS: PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT 2-4 MAY 1986.

NOW THAT THE ABOVE VISIT HAS BEEN OFFICIALLY ANNOUNCED LOCALLY WE HAVE RECEIVED THE FIRST REQUEST FOR AN 'EXCLUSIVE' INTERVIEW WITH THE PRIME MINISTER. I ENCLOSE A COPY OF A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT OF THE JOONG-ANG DAILY NEWS, ONE OF THE TWO MAIN KOREAN LANGUAGE DAILY NEWSPAPERS. WE WILL NO DOUBT RECEIVE OTHER REQUESTS FROM BOTH KOREAN LANGUAGE AND ENGLISH LANGUAGE NEWSPAPER EDITORS AND WOULD BE GRATEFUL FOR A LINE-TO-TAKE AS SOON AS POSSIBLE.

2. I RECALL CORRESPONDENCE, WHICH WE CANNOT NOW TRACE, ABOUT TWO YEARS AGO WHICH INDICATED THAT THE PRIME MINISTER DID NOT GRANT EXCLUSIVE INTERVIEWS OTHER THAN TO JOURNALISTS FROM COUNTRIES WHICH SHE WAS ABOUT TO VISIT. IF IT IS POSSIBLE THAT AN EXCLUSIVE INTERVIEW COULD BE OFFERED IN THE UK BEFORE MRS. THATCHER'S DEPARTURE THEN I CONSIDER THAT THE KOREAN NEWSPAPER WOULD BE PREPARED TO SEND A JOURNALIST TO LONDON FOR THIS PURPOSE.

3. THE DURATION OF THE PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT HERE IS LIKELY TO BE TOO SHORT FOR US TO BE ABLE TO FIT IN ANY EXCLUSIVE INTERVIEW DURING THE PROGRAMME. WE ARE THEREFORE HOLDING THE LINE WITH ENQUIRIES AT THE MOMENT THAT IT IS UNLIKELY THAT PRESS FACILITIES IN KOREA WILL GO BEYOND THE SCHEDULED PRESS CONFERENCE. IT WOULD IN ANY CASE BE DIFFICULT TO DECIDE WHICH PAPER TO WHICH TO OFFER AN EXCLUSIVE. THE DONG-A ILBO, WHICH HAS SUPPORTED BRITAIN FOR MANY YEARS AND HAS FINANCED E.G. ROYAL BALLET TOURING COMPANIES HERE WOULD PRESENT DIFFICULTIES OF PRESENTATION IF AN INTERVIEW WERE GRANTED TO ANOTHER PAPER HERE. SO, UNLESS IT IS POSSIBLE TO OFFER AN 'EXCLUSIVE' IN LONDON BEFORE DEPARTURE TO THE FIRST ENQUIRER, I.E. THE JOONG-ANG, THEN WE WOULD RECOMMEND THAT WE REFUSE ALL REQUESTS ON THE BASIS OF INSUFFICIENT TIME.

4. ARRANGEMENTS FOR TRAVELLING PRESS WILL BE MADE BY MYSELF AND OUR SENIOR INFORMATION OFFICER MR. SANGON CHU AND IT WOULD HELP US CONSIDERABLY HERE IF THE MAIN PRESS ARRANGEMENTS CORRESPONDENCE COULD BE UNCLASSIFIED AS FAR AS IS POSSIBLE.

4. ARRANGEMENTS FOR TRAVELLING PRESS WILL BE MADE BY MYSELF AND OUR SENIOR INFORMATION OFFICER MR. SANGON CHU AND IT WOULD HELP US CONSIDERABLY HERE IF THE MAIN PRESS ARRANGEMENTS CORRESPONDENCE COULD BE UNCLASSIFIED AS FAR AS IS POSSIBLE.

PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA:
2-4 MAY 1986

Thank you for your letter of 1 April enclosing a draft programme for the Prime Minister's visit to Korea. In general, the Prime Minister is well content with this and has agreed to the overall outline: that is, the Saturday morning in Seoul for formal engagements, the Saturday afternoon visiting Gloster Valley and Panmunjom, and the Sunday morning spent in the south of the country.

I would be content for the Embassy to go ahead with the detailed arrangements set out in their telegram number 143 subject to one or two points. The Prime Minister will certainly want to visit the National Cemetery on the first morning and lay a wreath. The most dispensable of the engagements that morning is the proposed courtesy call by the Minister of Foreign Affairs, and I am sure the Prime Minister would be happy to see this dropped from the programme if it would not offend Korean sensibilities to do so. It is always difficult to fit a press conference so early in the programme as here proposed but there seems no realistic alternative. The Prime Minister agrees to the proposal for drinks at the Residence after dinner on the Saturday night, though I would hope that the invitation card could include a departure time (say 2230). I am concerned, however, about the very brief period for the Prime Minister's hair appointment and for changing before dinner on the Saturday. We must allow at least 50 minutes in the programme for this.

The Prime Minister will I am sure accept that there is no time for her to go to church on Sunday 4 May. I should be grateful if the Embassy could explain this to Bishop Kim. Perhaps he could be invited to the reception on the Saturday evening. Finally, the Prime Minister would like to pursue the idea of presenting an item of British high technology equipment to Postech and I should be grateful if this could be followed up.

Prime Minister's Visit to the Republic of Korea: 2-4 May 1986

In his letter of 25 March to Charles Powell, Robert Culshaw referred to a draft programme for the Prime Minister's visit to Korea on her way to the Economic Summit in Tokyo. I now enclose an outline programme drawn up by the Embassy in conjunction with the FCO and the DTI. We believe that the main elements are likely to fit in with the Koreans' own ideas for the programme.

The Embassy, with DTI and FCO support, are keen that the Prime Minister should have an opportunity to see something of Korea's modern industry and of the contracts British firms have won. The major projects are all situated in the south of the Peninsula and it is necessary to fly down to the southern city of Pusan, where the UN Cemetery is situated and where the bodies of British servicemen killed in the Korean war are buried.

In order to make time, during the Prime Minister's short visit, to see the south of the country, the programme in Seoul is fairly compressed. However, since the Prime Minister and her colleagues will have met President Chun and four of his Ministers less than four weeks earlier, we believe that about an hour's talks with the President and half an hour with the Prime Minister will be enough. The President will of course host a meal, almost certainly dinner. It may be possible to gain a little more time if we can persuade the Koreans that the Prime Minister need not visit their National Cemetery to lay a wreath, although this is usually done by important visitors.

The Posco Steelworks at Pohang on the south-east coast, include blast furnaces provided by Davy McKee (UK) Ltd: following on from this they have now won a further order for a slag granulation unit. The point of flying over a nuclear power plant and over Ulsan is again to enable the Prime Minister to see projects that have had British involvement in the past where we also have hopes for the future (NEI/Parsons turbine generators). Appledore won a significant contract to help the Koreans establish the ship yards at Ulsan. There was also British involvement under George Turnbull in the Hyundai car assembly plant at Ulsan.

Postech is planned as an influential institute devoted to research. It is run by a professor who took his doctorate at Birmingham, and we hope that there will be a close British connection from the outset. We hope it might be possible to arrange for the Prime Minister to present an item of British high technology equipment (perhaps a computer), if she would be willing to do so. We hope the Prime Minister would also be able to meet the management of a Korean company at Pohang setting up the first carbon fibre plant in Korea under licence from RK Textiles, Composite Fibres, of Stockport.

Two visits are recommended for the morning of Sunday 4 May. Gloster Valley is the site of the heroic stand of The Gloucestershire Regiment against overwhelming Chinese forces during the Korean War. Panmunjom, situated in the middle of the Demilitarised Zone between North and South Korea, is the meeting place for the regular cross-border contacts of the UN Military Armistice Commission. It is also the venue for a series of bilateral meetings between North and South Korea instituted in 1984.

I should be grateful for confirmation that the Prime Minister is content for the Embassy in Seoul to discuss the programme formally with the Koreans.

The outline programme does not at present include an opportunity for the Prime Minister to go to church on Sunday 4 May. Would she wish to do so? You will recall that Bishop Simon Kim wrote to Mrs Thatcher on 20 March setting out times of services in English and in Korean at the Anglican Cathedral near the British Embassy.

The drinks at the Residence after the President's Dinner on 2 May would provide an opportunity to meet a cross section of distinguished Koreans from all fields, some of the British community, and some of the Korean and British members of the Embassy. This will go some way to pick up the ideas in Dr Skillend's letter to the Prime Minister, about which I wrote on 25 March.

I am copying this letter to John Mogg (DTI).

ADVANCE ADMINISTRATIVE ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE VISIT OF

1. Details of Visit

The Prime Minister and accompanying delegation will travel in an RAF VC10 on the following proposed itinerary:

2. Travel Documents

3. Health Requirements

The Treasury Medical Advisory Service state that inoculations are not compulsory, but strongly recommend inoculations against the following:-

Korea

Cholera: valid for 6 months
Typhoid: valid for 3 years
Tetanus: valid for 10 years
Polio : valid for 5 years

[Japan: tetanus and polio only - recommended]

Persons requiring inoculations may make appointments with the Treasury Medical Advisory Service, Tilbury House, Petty France (Tel No: 213 4111).

4. Climate and Clothing

Mid-day temperatures could reach 24°C. Midnight temperatures could drop to 7°C or below. Can be sunny mid-day. Lightweight spring wear should be satisfactory (suits or dress and jackets). Evenings can be very chilly and public buildings/Blue House would not normally be heated in May. Hats are not usually worn at ceremonies such as wreath-laying, but occasionally Embassy staff wear hats because it is a British occasion. Long dress/black tie needed for President's dinner. The Korean colours of mourning are black/white. A coat might be needed for Panmunjon and Gloster Valley.

5. Baggage

Those travelling on the RAF VC10 may take up to 66 lbs of personal baggage.
