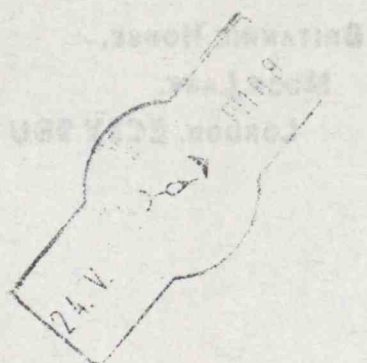
In the meantime, my very best wishes and personal support for your continued success.
